Each class member will focus on species in the San Francisco Zoo and design potential improvements for the captive habitat. MEETING ANNOUNCEMENT

The American Society of Zoologists is meeting December 27-30, 1979 at the Holiday Inn Hotel and Convention Center in Tampa, Florida with the American Microscopical Society and Society of Systematic Zoology. A comprehensive program of 10 symposia and about 450 contributed papers is planned.

PAPERS IN THE AREA OF ANIMAL BEHAVIOR ARE PARTICULARLY ENCOURAGED FOR THIS MEETING. ABSTRACTS ARE DUE AUGUST 31, 1979, and the appropriate forms plus a brochure with complete details of the meeting were recently mailed to ASZ members. ABS members are eligible to give a paper. Obtain the forms from the ASZ Business Office, Box 2739 California Lutheran College, Thousand Oaks, Ca. 91360.

A Symposium on Social Signals - Comparative and Endocrine Approaches, organized by Darcy Kelley and Monica Krieger is sponsored by the ASZ's Division of Animal Behavior, and co-sponsored by their Division of Comparative Endocrinology and the Animal Behavior Society. Participants will cover a variety of newly described signalling modalities in species ranging from fish to humans. A comparative approach will be emphasized in order to identify variables that may be important for the evolution of social signals. The symposium will also present new data on how the endocrine state of the individual is signalled to the social group. A deliberate effort has been made to include field studies as these are essential in understanding the real role of communicatory mechanisms in the natural history of species. The symposium is tentatively scheduled December 27 and 28 and contributed papers on the topic will follow the next day. Speakers include: Lynette Geyer, David Goldfoot, Martha McClintock, Pauline Yahr, Arthur Arnold, Owen Floody, Steven Green, Elizabeth Adkins, David Crews, Carol Diakow, Norman Stacey, Cheryl Harding, Cathy Cox and Tom Gordon.

A second Symposium, Behavioral and Reproductive Biology of Sea Turtles, is organized by David Owens for the ASZ's Division of Ecology and is co-sponsored by their Divisions of Comparative Endocrinology and Animal Behavior plus the Animal Behavior Society. The papers will summarize the unique traits of the sea turtle's behavioral and reproductive biology where appropriate, and place sea turtles in evolutionary perspective with regard to other reptiles and vertebrates in general. Although the primary emphasis will be basic biology, special sections will be devoted to discussing modern techniques of egg, hatchling and adult handling which will be of particular use to the conservationist. Speakers include: Archie Carr, James Wood, Harold Hirth, Ross Witham, Nicholas Mrosovsky, Paul Licht, Ralph Ackerman, William Rainey, Rainer Zangerl, John R. Hendrickson, Peter Pritchard and David Owens. Tentatively, the program is scheduled December 28, with a discussion session that evening, and contributed papers on Sea Turtles the next day.

Socials arranged for all participants include cash bars, a party, and brunch following a special address by Dr. David Premack of the University of Pennsylvania speaking on "Language and Intelligence in Ape and Man". The Division of Animal Behavior has a Business Meeting scheduled the afternoon of December 27 followed by a hosted reception.

With rates at the Holiday Inn of \$19 for single rooms and \$24 for double rooms, and advance registration fees of \$25 regular and \$12.50 for graduate students, this is a very affordable meeting. Even in December, Florida's subtropical climate should provide warm temperatures and an abundance of sunshine. You are invited to come to Tampa and enjoy Florida's Sun Coast.
